## Nevada POLST Side One: Medical Orders

### Section A: CPR

<b>A</b> Choose 1	<b>CARDIOPULMONARY RESUSCITATION (CPR) – Patient/resident has no pulse &amp; is not breathing</b>

Section A addresses a patient’s desire for resuscitation. Patients should understand that when the heart stops and breathing ceases, the patient has died. There may be a chance to “bring them back”, but the statistics regarding success and return to previous function, considering this patient’s particular situation, should be discussed.

There are two options:

- **Attempt Resuscitation (CPR)**

*If this option is checked, then Section B - Full Treatment should also be checked to assure intubation and cardioversion are attempted.*

*It is also important to explain the implications of CPR for your specific patient. Considering their current general health status, they should understand how resuscitation may affect both the quality and quantity of additional life expectancy. Topics to discuss may include the results of chest compressions (broken or cracked ribs and associated discomfort), intubation preventing speech and potential dependency, and ICU admission as well as other treatments. Patients should be provided statistics of successful CPR for patients in their condition.*

- **Do Not Resuscitate (Allow Natural Death)**

If this box is checked, the patient should be made comfortable in whatever setting they are currently. They should not be transferred to a facility. Patients no longer need the State issued DNR Identification, but should they have one, it is still valid, but be sure both documents agree. The POLST is a medical order; a State issued DNR Identification is not required. To help patients make a decision, this website has many resources to help explain these choices. - If a patient is experiencing a health crisis, but is not in cardiopulmonary arrest, then refer to Section B for additional options.
